The Landshut Wedding (German: Landshuter Hochzeit) is one of the largest historical pageants in Europe and takes place only every four years. This year the 500-year-old tradition is happening again! For a week of festivities, more than 2,000 participants will recreate the wedding of the Polish King's daughter, Hedwig to George, the son of the Duke of Bavaria-Landshut. During this time, the town is transformed into previous times with medieval jousting, pageantry and feasting traditions of the Renaissance. Together with our tour guide, we will follow the path of Hedwig and George through the historic city center down to the tournament grounds.

Events in Munich

► Wednesday, 15th of February 2017 – Sunday, 19th of August 2018: energy.transitions

A major challenge of our time is to find clean, economically viable and reliable ways of providing energy. Since 2011 Germany has been addressing this challenge with the "energy transition". But Germany is not the only country seeking to transform its energy supply system. Around the world, 144 countries have set renewable energy targets (Renewables Global Status Report, REN21, 2014). The goal is to reduce CO2 emissions and energy costs while eliminating dependencies. A further challenge is the global rise in energy demand. With the special exhibition *energie.wenden*, the Deutsches Museum is addressing this global issue. The exhibition explains how energy is generated, stored and distributed, as well as energy requirements and utilization, and places these topics in an historical and global context. Exhibits in the 1000 square meter space include originals, models, demonstrations, media stations with energy-related content, and also presents the stakeholders in the world of energy. The *energie.wenden* exhibition is not concerned only with electric power. It also examines heat, mobility and manufacturing, and focuses on the many possible approaches to a conscious energy transition and challenges visitors to make that transition a reality.

Sunday, 23rd of July: Kocherlball

The Kocherlball or "Cooks' Ball" is an early morning dance-fest that takes place around the Chinese Tower in Munich's English Garden. Back in the old days the city's servants, cooks and nannies would get up early to meet and dance around the tower from about 5 a.m. to 8 a.m. This was often the only time the lower-classes could get off work because their masters were still asleep. Nowadays more than 15,000 people flock to the tower to recreate the old days every year. Many dress up, either in modern Bavarian Lederhosen or Dirndl dresses, or in period costumes. Dances including the polka, waltz and a local jig called the Münchener Francaise are performed. But not everyone comes to dance. Many are just there to enjoy the atmosphere and grab a bite to eat. This isn't an event that attracts a lot of international tourists so there's a really authentic feel to it all. All in all, it's a unique and seldom-experienced part of Munich history!



► Little "How do Germans tick" Guide: All About Recycling in Germany

Recycling is Germany's contribution to the global battle for the environment – but the whole subject of recycling can be a daunting issue. The good news is that there are some easy guidelines to follow.

Any kind of bottle or glass jar that is non-returnable and on which you did not pay a deposit or "Pfand", belongs in the designated glass bins. This includes wine, oil or juice bottles as well as jam/preserve jars. There are different slots for depositing green, brown and clear colored glass. You will find these bins in every neighborhood. The only thing to take note of here is the times when you should not recycle. Remember Quiet Time? That is not the time to recycle your bottles or you take the risk to get fined.

All packaging made of paper and cardboard, newspapers, magazines, waste paper, paper bags, etc. belong in the blue bins. If you don't have a blue bin at your home, you will certainly find one somewhere in your neighborhood. You are supposed to flatten boxes before putting them in the bin, and make sure you throw only the box and not the plastic wrappers inside the box, in the bin.

The other bins you will encounter are usually at your doorstep, and are color coded; green, blue, yellow, brown and gray. Sometimes the whole bin is the color in question, sometimes just the lid. Cans, plastic, polystyrene, aluminum, tinplate and "composite" materials like beverage cartons made of a mixture of materials belong in the yellow bin. A kind request has been made to rinse the cans and cups before throwing them in the bin since they get sorted by hand.

Bio stuff is anything destined for the compost heap in a good gardener's back yard. This includes kitchen scraps, peels, leftover food, coffee filters, tea bags and garden waste. If you live in a house, you probably will have a separate brown bin for this. The end result of bio recycling is either energy through the natural fermenting gasses, which is captured and utilized, or garden compost. Finally the gray bin is also the destiny of "almost the rest". This includes ash, cigarette butts, old household objects like textiles and nappies/diapers, tissues etc. Everything in the gray bins will be incinerated.

Another useful feature of the waste disposal system in most cities is the Recyclinghof, an outlying area to which you can transport your trash and Sperrmüll with your car. They are equipped with containers for the deposit of such things as furniture, batteries, electrical and electronic items, paper, plastic, cans, glass, wood and garden waste. The personnel there can guide you to the proper bin.

Despite the extra effort and diligence required by First World Recycling, it does provide a sense of pride to know that you actually managed to figure out the German recycling system - something for your résumé, no doubt!
